## Novita backs SANFL Wheelchair Football League



Novita is proud to be the naming rights partner of the South Australian National Football League's inaugural wheelchair football competition.

The Novita SANFL Wheelchair Football League will kick off in July, and will include teams from four SANFL clubs – Central District, Norwood, Sturt and Woodville-West Torrens.

Novita Chief Executive Officer Greg Ward says sponsoring the 2021 wheelchair football season is an excellent fit for the organisation, because as well as delivering the best services and supports for our clients, Novita also strives to improve disability awareness and inclusion.

"Our partnership with the Novita SANFL Wheelchair Football League will join our popular Wheelienet awareness program as frontline tools to promote accessibility and inclusion, as well as the health and social benefits of getting involved in sport for people living with disability," he says.

Wheelchair football is played by teams of five on a basketball court with goal posts at each end. A handball is equivalent to a kick in wheelchair football, and an underarm throw is the equivalent of a handball.

The teams can be mixed gender and include players living with and without disability, meaning it's a fully inclusive sport that everyone can play and enjoy.

Wheelchair football is fun, fast-paced and tactical, and interest in the game has been growing strongly in South Australia in recent years, with our State team – captained by former Novita client Brodie Healy – winning four consecutive Wheelchair Aussie Rules National Championships between 2016 and 2019.

The SANFL, supported by Novita, has been conducting wheelchair football 'come and play' sessions at The Lights Community and Sports Centre to encourage people to try the sport and find recruits for the new League.

#### Guide to Wheelchair Football

There's so much to love about wheelchair football, an adapted version of Australian Rules Football. This fast-paced, skilful and inclusive game provides Australian Rules footy enthusiasts living with or without disability the opportunity to play the game in a way that has strong parallels with the traditional game. Learn how to play the game with this helpful guide!

#### The Rules of the Game

Two teams of five players compete on an indoor basketball court with goal posts at either end.

The court is divided into three zones: a centre zone and two scoring zones. Each team has two defenders, two forwards and one midfielder.

Handballing is the equivalent of a kick.

A tap from one player to an opponent is classified as a tackle and the player who has been tapped has three seconds to offload the ball.

A mark is awarded when the ball has travelled at least three metres.


The forward players on each team are the only players who can score, and they do so by handballing the ball between the goal posts.

#### Prepping to Play

Erin Coutts, Novita exercise physiologist, provides some exercise preparation and recovery ideas below that can support wheelchair football players.

There are also some matching equipment suggestions.

As always, see your health professional for guidance before starting new exercises.



#### Pushing

The movement of pushing the wheelchair to move around the court involves the use of arm and shoulder muscles.

Exercise suggestions:

- Overhead tricep extension with a resistance band
- Seated chest press with a resistance band with handles
- Seated front raises with a resistance band with handles or a slam ball

#### Endurance

Playing wheelchair football uses the cardiovascular system. Here are some suggestions to assist in increasing cardiovascular fitness and exercise tolerance to support playing wheelchair football for four 10-minute quarters.

Exercise suggestions:

- Hand pedalling with pedalling exercise equipment
- Seated boxing (air boxing)

#### **Core Strength**

Is important for maintaining upright posture in the wheelchair while playing.

Exercise suggestions:

- Seated twists with a slam ball
- Side bends in a seated position with a resistance band with handles

#### Hand Strength

Finger and hand strength can be developed to support handling the football.

Exercise suggestions:

• Hand grip exercise with a tool such as hand grip loops

#### **Ball Skills**

To improve hand-eye coordination and strength, alongside fine and gross motor skills to support ball skills.

Exercise suggestion:

- Seated bicep curls with a resistance band with handles
- Seated pectoral flies with a resistance band with handles
- Seated chest pass against wall with slam ball
- Single arm underarm toss against wall with a pilates ball

#### Recovery

It's a great idea to repair and rebuild muscles following exercise.

Suggestions:

- Self-massage with a therapy roller or massage ball
- Upper body stretches eg shoulder flexion, where you move your arms anywhere from a resting position by your sides to straight above your head
- Apply ice packs for muscle recovery

## Novita SANFL Wheelchair League Spins Off

July 15, 2021

The inaugural Novita SANFL Wheelchair Football League is set to spin off on Friday night, with a double-header to be played at Lights Community and Sports Centre.

With four SANFL clubs – Woodville-West Torrens, Norwood, Sturt and Central District – involved the competition is the first of its kind in South Australia.

A total of 32 players have been drafted by the four SANFL clubs, with each team consisting of 7-8 players of mixed gender and a blend of those with, and without, a disability, ensuring the sport is attractive for everyone to participate.

Speaking on SANFL Radio, Woodville-West Torrens defender Chris Simpson said he was eagerly anticipating the season-opener, having played the sport for at least five years.

The experienced backman initially took up Wheelchair Football to play alongside of his son Nathan, who has cerebral palsy and now treasures the 2016 National Championship title they won together playing for South Australia.

Played on a basketball court with goal posts at either end, Wheelchair Football involves teams of five facing off against each other with two defenders, two forwards and one midfielder.

A handball in Wheelchair Football is equivalent of a 'kick' and an underarm throw equates to a 'handball' as per regular Australian Football rules.

"It's a fast, fun, tactical and skilful game and we encourage everyone to give it a go," SANFL Disability Programs Coordinator Nathan Pepper said.

"South Australia has been a four-time champion at the Wheelchair Aussie Rules National Carnival from 2016 to 2019, so the new league will build on this success and create an opportunity to play regularly in a local competition."



#### NFC Wheelchair Match Report – Round 2

August 9, 2021

Waiting for what seemed like months to get back on court after our Round 1 loss, was worth the wait. Our team got the job done against Central District on Sunday, at the Lightsview Community Centre.

# The first SANFL Wheelchair Football League is more than just a competition for players

#### Key points:

- South Australia has its first wheelchair football league
- It welcomes players from all backgrounds
- The teams are aligned with existing professional teams

For former army engineer Nigel Greenslade, wheelchair sport isn't just a pastime, it's a lifesaver.

"Wheelchair sport has saved my life, it's lifesaving" Mr Greenslade said.

He led an active sporting life and played rugby for South Australia before a workplace accident changed his life.

"We were building a bridge and some panels collapsed on me ... I thought I was going to die," he said.

As he went through his recovery and realised, he would not return to his sporting endeavours, his demons grew.

"I have had thoughts about getting off this planet, I locked myself away in my house for a few years," he said.

Despite those challenges, he recovered in-part through the help of wheelchair sports.

After his long journey back, he has been named captain of Central District Football Club's inaugural wheelchair football team.

"I remember back into the 80s — all I wanted to do was play for Central District when I was a kid," he said.

"To be able to put on this strip, the same strip that some of those legends had, is outstanding.

"From being depressed at home, doing nothing, to thinking bad thoughts to getting out here and having a go, to pushing my boundaries, trying to get fit, to chase the kids, to see the expressions, to share some joy — it's been great."

#### 'It opens their eyes'

As a familiar red ball flies through the air, the thud of body-on-body is replaced with the clattering of metal-on-metal.

It's football, just not as you might know it.

The game is played on a basketball court with goals at each end.

Players chase each other along a sprung wooden floor, as shouts of encouragement battle umpires' whistles that echo around the stadium.

Four South Australian state-league teams — Sturt, Norwood, Woodville West Torrens and Central District — have squads in this year's competition.

Five players take the court at a time. A throw is a handball, a handball is a kick, and a touch is a tackle.

There's holding the ball and participants put everything on the line with players tipping their chairs in the heat of battle.

From war veterans to refugees, the league welcomes all.

Lloyd Banwell lost his leg in a workplace accident after playing more than 400 amateur football games for Salisbury North in Adelaide's northern suburbs.

For him the opportunity for people with disabilities to play alongside those who did not provides an opportunity to educate.

"It opens their eyes up as well you know, how hard it is you know to get around in a wheelchair," Mr Banwell said.

The opportunity to share experiences goes even further for war veteran Darren Peters.

After multiple overseas deployments to wars including Iraq and Afghanistan, his injuries left him unable to play sport.

Wheelchair sports have given him the outlet he needed to recover from his service.

"I came out of there and I had chronic injuries, and chronic PTSD and depression, which I openly talk about," Mr Peters said.

He said the unique nature of the game helped people share in a love of sport and a special camaraderie.



## 2021 SANFL Annual Report

Page 26 of the 2021 SANFL Annual Report, under the heading "SANFL Programs", reported the following:

"Disability Novita SANFL Wheelchair Football League In 2021, SANFL launched the Novita SANFL Wheelchair Football League to create a regular, sustainable program primarily focused on enabling people with a physical disability to get active and connect with the football community. A total of 35 players were drafted into four SANFL Clubs: Central District, Norwood, Sturt and Woodville-West Torrens. Teams had players, both male and female, with and without disability, and an age range spanning eight to 61 years. All matches were livestreamed to allow all club supporters, family and friends to watch the competition if they could not attend due to COVID-19 restrictions. The Grand Final was attended by more than 200 people, including the Premier, The Hon. Steven Marshall, who presented inaugural premiers Sturt with the winning trophy. The success of the competition was recognised by winning the Active Inclusion Award at the 2021 South Australian Sport Awards. "
